Advocacy Impact

Working collaboratively, we have seen progress in many areas of OCFP's advocacy:

A \$1.8B investment over four years, through the Primary Care Action Team, that prioritizes:

- Reducing the admin burden through digital tools, modernizing information sharing and improving the referral process.
- Bringing team-based resources to more patients and family physicians.
- Targeted recruitment and retention strategies for northern and rural communities.

Additional Progress Includes:



\$300M over four years for 17 new/ expanded community-based teaching clinics, training future family doctors and attaching more patients.

Changing the Way We Work Community of Practice

While we've shifted our focus from providing COVID-19 updates each session, we include an overview of circulating infectious diseases and vaccine-preventable illnesses each session.



Program Highlights:

- 8504 participants participated in 15 sessions
 with an average of 567 attendees per session—
 the highest attended session included
 663 participants.
- 98 per cent of attendees reported that they value the overall experience of the CoP with 95 per cent reporting that the CoP is relevant and applicable to their practice.

Practising Well Community of Practice (CoP)

The Practising Well CoP continues to offer sessions on topics that matter most to family physicians. Highlights this year included events on best practices for diagnosing and treating ADHD in primary care, an introduction to supporting patients through the opioid crisis and strategies for preventing burnout through effective boundary setting.



Program Highlights:

- 1804 attendees over 12 sessions with an average of 150 participants per session.
- 96 per cent of attendees report value from the program and the overall experience, and 91 per cent report applicability to their practice.

Peer Connect

Supporting family physicians at all career stages, Peer Connect offers a space to connect with colleagues, share experiences and gain practical strategies for managing patients with issues related to mental health, chronic pain and/or substance use. Participants receive guidance to navigate challenges while also making space to strengthen their own well-being and sustain effective, compassionate care in a demanding health-care system.



Program Highlights:

- Peer Guides **provided 283.5 hours of mentorship**, while Learners engaged in **over 400 hours of learning** through the program.
- Through 1:1 and small group learning, Peer Learners collectively earned 1,166 Mainpro+ credits, a **55 per cent increase** from the previous year.

Mainpro+

In 2024-2025, OCFP processed 203 applications—an increase of 45 per cent from 2023-2024, ensuring members can earn Mainpro+ credits through participation in accredited education across a wide spectrum of topics.



Promoting Lifelong Learning



Leadership Academy

In partnership with the Rotman School of Management, OCFP conducted two cohorts of the Leadership Academy, a program developed to cultivate and strengthen leadership skills among family physicians.

Program Highlights:

- 60 family physicians from across Ontario participated.
- 100 per cent of evaluation respondents report that the program met their expectations and that they could apply what they learned directly to their work.



- Beginning tenure as co-chair of a Primary Care Network.
- Serving as an academic program director for a family medicine residency program.
- Applying to serve on Ontario Health committees.
- Pursuing a call to the bar in Health Law to engage in system-level advocacy.
- Leading the development of a mobile Community Health Centre.

Clinical Application of the Long-Term Care (LTC) Fracture Prevention Recommendations for Frail Older Adults

Designed to address existing care gaps by illustrating the application of pharmacological and non-pharmacological fracture prevention recommendations with frail older adults

in long term care (LTC). Participants are better able to assess fracture risk using the Fracture Risk Scale, apply evidence-based recommendations for fracture prevention in LTC and recognize challenges and barriers to implementing the recommendations and use enablers.

An Associate Professor with NOSM University, Dr. Desilets has held many academic roles. Her current leadership roles include Chief of Staff, Temiskaming Hospital, Chair, South Temiskaming Medical Education Group and Secretary, Society of Rural Physicians of Canada.

New OCFP Initiatives

Patient-Nominated Awards

During the summer of 2024, OCFP launched a campaign asking patients to share how their family doctors have gone above and beyond for them. The response was overwhelming. We heard from patients across the province about the impact family doctors have had on their lives, resulting in the recognition of 750 family physicians.

Osteoporosis and Fracture Prevention Workshop

In October 2024, OCFP and Ontario Osteoporosis Strategy launched a refreshed Osteoporosis and Fracture Prevention Workshop which significantly increased participants' comfort level in diagnosing, treating and managing osteoporosis in their practice.

 94 per cent of participants expressed that they learned something new and could recognize and describe the impact of osteoporosis fractures as well as the current care gap, including key barriers and facilitators to quality care.

Health Equity Community of Practice

A new program was launched to strengthen the capacity of primary care practitioners to deliver high-quality, trauma-informed care to individuals and communities affected by marginalization and adverse social determinants of health. The first session was held in June 2025, and OCFP will offer up to six sessions annually, based on topics members have asked for.

Simulated Office Orals (SOOs)

A program expansion, building on our CFPC Exam Orientation Workshop, participants (IMG Practice Eligible Candidates) are provided with an opportunity to practice four additional SOO cases and receive real-time performance feedback from CFPC members.
